Municipal Building Fires are a Real Risk with Heavy Consequences The purpose of this standard shall be to provide a reasonable degree of protection for life and property from fire through standardization of design, installation, and testing requirements for sprinkler systems, including private fire service mains, based on sound engineering principles, test data, and field experience.

Fires in the workplace aren't as rare as we'd like to think. Over 100,000 fires per year take place in commercial buildings 90 deaths and 1350 injuries per year occur as a result of commercial building fires. When they do occur, they can cause irreplaceable damage. The breakout of a fire can be catastrophic to municipalities in equipment, records and structural losses, it is important that a community protect its employees, assets and records to do so they must maintain specific safety standards. The National Fire Protection Association and Department of Labor have put in place the NFPA 101 LIFE SAFETY CODE and TITLE XXIII LABOR Chapter 277 SAFETY AND HEALTH OF EMPLOYEES.

It is the duty of the Joint Loss Committee to evaluate possible risks and make recommendations to operational policies and building improvements to reduce risks town wide.

Along with the 19 calls for service we performed the following.

Training 6/19 - Forcible entry training with two State Fire Academy instructors and the academy training trailer.

The Building Inspector and Fire Chief conducted a site visit to the old meeting house to review condition and requirements to approve occupancy upon completion of the building. Without a conceptual plan, occupancy load could only be an estimate as only a vision of an individual's concept was provided. For the building department and fire department to definitively provide a number of occupants a full set of plans must be provided.

6/24 - 2K Race assistance units provided - Ambulance 1, the CanAm 6-wheel drive EMS vehicle and car 1 with crews to support the day's activities.

6/24 - Fire Inspection at Birch hill Summer Camp in preparation of opening Day 6/25

After working with the Boodey Farmstead Committee they have received all state and local permits and approvals for their event schedule on July 15 this year.

Fire permit duty as always 3 hours Saturday morning for public access to questions on rules and regulations along with an introduction to the online permitting process. We responded to one call for trees and wires down on Kings Highway.

We know you all are not enjoying the wet weather, but it has reduced the threat of wildland fires and we have been enjoying the break. At the same time has preserved the forestry budget for a predicted dry season this fall.
